Honouring Indigenous History Month

I'm honoured to have been asked to help you understand the value of Indigenous history month (June). It is a month set aside to encourage Canadians to learn more about the Indigenous people, who were the caretakers of the land we live on, since time immemorial. I feel the best way to do this is to share my journey of discovery and how I have come to love, value, and embrace the beauty and ways of Indigenous people in Canada.

I emigrated to Canada in 1974, with my husband and three children in tow. A year later, with no house to call home, we left Montreal and travelled across Canada (what many Indigenous people call Turtle Island - which refers to the continent we know as North America); camping and living in a tent.


One day, while in beautiful British Columbia, it poured rain on us. We were wet and miserable, with no dry clothes. I was pregnant and it was challenging - imagine a soggy tent after several days of rain and three cranky children. While walking through the town of Mission, BC, a stranger approached us and offered a place for us to warm up and get dry - but it was more than that - he took us to a gathering space in the community where the children played and did crafts with other children and had snacks, while my husband and I enjoyed a warm cup of coffee and a reprieve. This was my first experience of Indigenous people in Canada. Their generosity, helpfulness, and kindness in a time of need is an experience I have never forgotten. It sparked a curiosity and interest that continues to this day.

Fast forward to 2004. While living in Verona and after hearing a member of the community talk about a drum circle she attended, I became curious. It brought back memories of my childhood - and the joy I felt playing a toy drum I had. I expressed my interest in learning more and perhaps joining her some time at the drum circle. She said she would tell the others about my interest and a short time later I was invited to experience their drum circle. I had no drum, didn't know what to do as I had no knowledge of protocols or customs. Nonetheless, the people in the circle welcomed me. They gave me a drum, told me how women generally wear a skirt when drumming to honour the feminine, and I began to learn. Interestingly, the songs sounded so familiar - and yet, how could that be I wondered, I am from Switzerland.

The joy and pleasure I continue to experience as I journey and learn with my Indigenous friends, participating in many different drum circles, pow wows and sacred ceremonies continues to this day...and I am still learning. I have had to be humble and vulnerable, risk making mistakes, perhaps saying something inappropriate - but I have discovered, when my heart is pure and I am sincerely interested in learning and understanding, it doesn't matter.

The Elders say "there are no mistakes, all the experiences we have are simply *learnings*." You too, can experience learning. I encourage you to open your heart. Be vulnerable. Be curious. Go to a pow wow, ask questions, experience a sweat lodge, learn how to smudge and what it symbolizes - be not afraid - have courage and take baby steps to discover the beauty of Indigenous ways of being - and you will come to realize we really are all one - just as the hymn *We Are All One People* by Joseph Naytowhow, that we sing as a congregation reminds us (Hymn More Voices #141).

Proclaim the Works of the Lord!

"You shall live and not die and proclaim the works of the Lord!" And with these personal words of life spoken on the inside of me from Psalm 118:17 came a flood of Peace covering me.

Due to tiredness and weakness in the late summer of 2019 Carol suggested I have some blood work done, and now as we sat across from the head doctor at KGH in the cancer clinic who had just announced the results of the tests as to what was causing the symptoms I had been experiencing. "It's Non Hodgkin's Lymphoma cancer stage 4 and it is aggressive." I can only say that from that moment on I told the doctor that I was a Christian. I placed myself at their mercy for them to do their thing and when they were done the Lord would take over.



Much of my journey from there on I don't remember, having some of my memory wiped out due to the treatments, but I

do remember the Peace I was living in. God was with me as my wife and the care team monitored me through all the hurdles and hoops along the way. I had told Carol to tell those who we let know of my condition, when they said a prayer for me to "Thank God for my healing." Later in speaking with my brother Phil, he said when he heard the news of my condition, it was the first time he had prayed in years.

There was one particular part of the care plan though that the doctor's had laid out for me that I refused to participate in and that was a course at the hospital on Palliative care. The 'higher word' I had received was that I would live and not die, so I wanted no part of how to prepare to die. However they were quite persistent, and they sent someone who came into our home to prepare me for what they believed would be my final outcome. As I had said at one point, they had tried to shove me in a box and I wouldn't go.

Carol and I understand the power of our spoken words and how vital they are to our well being. When I was losing weight like someone stuck a pin in me and had let all my weight drain away, Carol ask the doctor why the rapid weight loss, and she told her that the cancer was consuming all of the nutrition I was taking in. Carol pondered over that, as we had to eat and yet didn't want to be feeding the cancer. At our very next meal she took my hand when we said the Blessing over our meal and we began a new prayer with the addition of one word which we continue to this day and it was **"Bless this food to our use <u>ONLY</u> and us in thy service. In Jesus name we ask it. Amen."** The weight loss stabilized. It has taken me a long time to regain the near 100 pounds that I lost, but that is okay. And the large lump the earlier tests that had shown in October of last year, which was nearly two years later, was completely gone. The doctor's had done their part and we had done ours and starved the cancer by refusing to feed it.

In April of 2022 Carol asked our lady who had been sent to prepare me for death, when I could go back into the hospital to have my blood work done as several months had passed without it being tested. She said she didn't know and was reluctant to offer us any answer, so I spoke up and told

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her what we had been believing and practicing from a Christian's respect, and I repeated the question "When can I have my blood work done?" She jumped up from where she had been sitting and said "I don't know, we deal with death not life." We were soon in to have the blood work done and as I continued to experience life and not death, she discharged herself from our care after the results of the blood work came in and referred us back to our own general practitioner, who, on our first trip back to see her after many months, still treated me as a Palliative Care case. However, that soon changed and now have been officially welcomed back to the land of the living.

The time, days and care taken as the battle was raging in my body, I am really not aware of but one thing I know for sure is I thank my God who is faithful to his word bringing me through. I thank my family who never gave up on me, as Alyssa our one granddaughter had said when she heard Grampa had cancer, "If anybody can beat it Grampa can, he's the strongest man I know!" And I did! Another granddaughter Katie kept me supplied with homemade tomato soup, my favourite, and canned it for me in little jars. Our grandchildren couldn't come to visit us due to Covid-19 but they were never far away. Jesse, Lily and Chelsea three other grandchildren came and helped stock our woodshed for the winter as did our best friends from the north, Reg, Ellie, their daughter Pam and a helper, plus our son Lyle. I was too ill to have gotten it done when I should have. Lyle who works in the area checked in almost daily. Our daughter's Lydia and Liza came and gave Carol time to go out and get her groceries. Thanks to Reverend Catherine and our Church family who stood by many times feeling helpless but continuing with their prayers, calls of encouragement, cards expressing care, giving us hope and with gifts dropped off at the door. Plus thanks to our neighbour Don Coleman's wife Mary, who came and helped Carol dig her precious potatoes from the garden before the frost got the best of them. It has been guite a journey. I thank God for each and all of you who were a part of my recovery including our siblings. Slowly, slowly I am regaining my physical strength, my voice which I lost many times, has now returned to where I am able to join the church choir again, and my life goes on.

On June 17th Carol and I celebrated our 56th Wedding Anniversary. We have been blessed with three children, fourteen grand children, one of which has already taken his place in heaven, and eleven great grandchildren with another one due in July.

And I am amazed as I proclaim the works of the Lord! Thanks be to God.
